Te Puāwaitanga o te Rito

In 2026, Kererū Rua will include our Bilingual Te Reo Māori class, named **Te Puāwaitanga o te Rito Teina**, meaning “the blossoming of the flax shoot.” The word teina meaning the younger age group.

In Māori tradition, te rito (central shoot of the harakeke/flax plant) represents the tamariki (children), surrounded and protected by the outer leaves, which symbolise whānau, community, and teachers. As te rito grows, it blossoms into its full potential, supported by those around it.



Leila McLean will be the kaiako/teacher of this class, and both Sara Morrow and Sarah Shearer (Hera) will teach regular English medium classes. All 3 classes will work together for Literacy and Mathematics with children learning in English and Te Puāwaitanga having an increased instructional reo Māori component.

For Te Reo Māori and kaupapa Māori learning, the bilingual class will have dedicated time to focus on these areas in depth. We have spent considerable time working out how this class will operate, and our approach will foster a sense of unity across all 3 classes while celebrating and supporting the unique strengths of our bilingual programme.

- A big smile and positive attitude! 😊

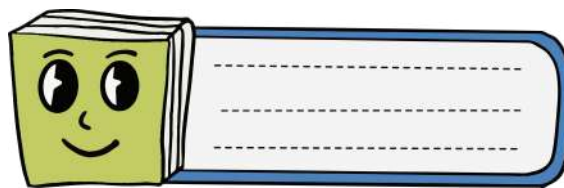
Please ensure all toys and valuables are kept at home.

Attendance/School Hours

Term 1 Focus



How the World was Made

This term, our main overarching Inquiry focus will be around the story called, 'Why the World Was Made.' This is a traditional oral tale told from Native America and passed down for generations. This story relates very closely to our purākau, **Ranginui and Papatūānuku**, and how this story is closely linked to our school's name - Te Ao Mārama (The World of Light).

For our Inquiry (Pākiki - Play Provocations), we will focus on Health, Science and Te Ao Māori.

Health & Physical Education

This term, we have Harold and the Life Education caravan coming in the first two weeks. Harold and his team focus on teaching us about some of the important concepts that we will be covering this term:

- What makes us special and unique
- How to make friends
- How to be good friend
- Approaching and joining in
- Including others



We will unpack what the skill is, why it's important and delve into the dos and don'ts of actioning a given skill. These skills will be integrated into our Physical Education programme.



Science – Putaiao



We will explore Earth (rotations, night and day), the Sun and shadows.



Te Ao Māori

We will explore Te Marae, what a marae is, its significance and importance, and we will be visiting Hukanui Marae in Week 6 as well. More details will be shared at a later date.
